Syria

The conflict in Syria has continued to make news since the Civil War began in 2011. In October the USA withdrew all its forces, enabling the Turkish army to invade Northern Syria to establish a 'buffer zone' between Syria and its border.

An ethnic group known as the Kurds are fighting for freedom and independence in the region they believe to be a homeland, whilst also supporting the West in the fight against Religious Extremism.

Extinction Rebellion are a protest group which are fighting to force governments in the world to do more to fight against climate change. Since the spring of 2019 they have engaged in 'direct action' protests to disrupt day to day life in cities around the world and raise attention to their cause. Many support this action as essential to bring more rapid change to reduce global warming, however others believe their protests to be too disruptive and beyond the accepted limits of direct action protest.
